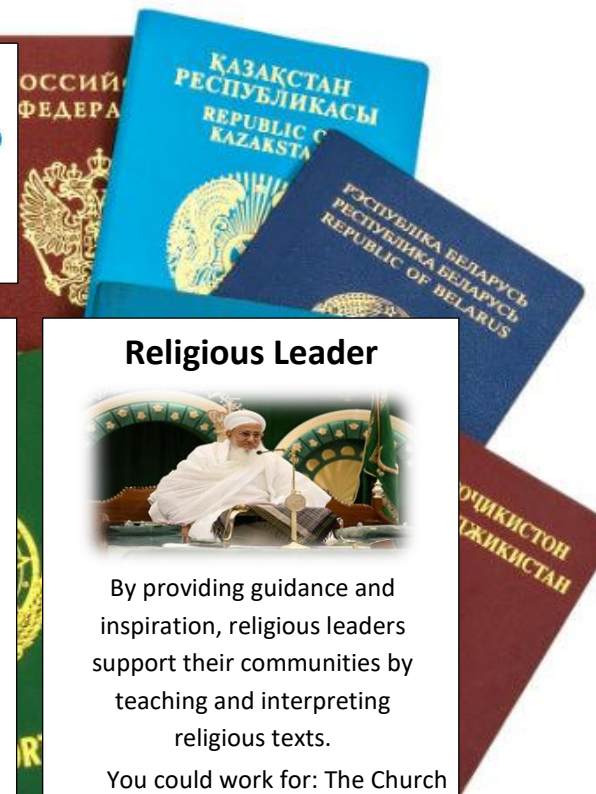




Careers in Citizenship, Philosophy and Ethics



What is it all about?

Citizenship Philosophy and Ethics is about the gives students an insight into the real world and their place in it. The courses have been designed to inspire learners and motivate them to continue learning beyond the classroom.

The GCSE Citizenship course introduces students to key citizenship issues and helps them develop a practical understanding of what it means to be a citizen today. They acquire the knowledge and skills necessary to think critically and play a positive role in public life.

The GCSE Religious Studies: Philosophy and Ethics encourage students to adopt an enquiring, critical and reflective approach to the study of religion. It helps students to explore religions and beliefs, and reflect on fundamental questions.

Throughout your study you will develop key intellectual skills such as critical evaluation, debate and understanding of different cultures locally, nationally and in the wider world alongside problem solving and communication skills.

Why should you study it?

- 1 Deepen your knowledge of democracy and government, the law, rights and responsibilities and how we live together in society.
- 2 Study issues that relate to the modern world, often making good use of local and national news to underpin our discussions and debates.
- 3 The subjects help to develop cultural and social awareness of places around the world.

Civil Service

By providing guidance and inspiration, religious leaders support their communities by teaching and interpreting religious texts.

You could work for: The Church

Teacher



Teachers get to share knowledge, and dig deeply into topics, learning something new along the way, making a difference in the lives of many students.

You could work for: Schools
Average Pay = £32,000

Social Worker



Social workers support individuals and their families through difficult times and ensure that vulnerable people, are safeguarded from harm.

You could work for: Councils
Average Pay = £29,000

International Development



Helping those in need, International Development workers set up sustainable solutions to local problems around the developing world.

You could work for: Red Cross
